About the Artist:

National award-winning storyteller, Christopher Leebrick, has enthralled audiences with his remarkable storytelling ability since the age of thirteen. Since 1975 he has performed from coast to coast at: festivals, theatres, concert halls, schools, libraries, and campfires. All three of his CDs have received national *Storytelling World* awards.

Utilizing a rich flexible voice and a dynamic stage presence with powerful acting, Christopher brings to life the ancient art of storytelling. Young and old enjoy his extensive repertoire of world: folktales, original stories, narrative poetry, whoppers and jump tales. He also sets the mood for many of his tales with instruments such as the harmonica and the eastern cedar flute.

Performance Detail:

A great way for Christopher to serve an entire school is through a combination of performance assemblies followed by classroom workshops. This combination leaves students excited about writing and telling stories as well as exploring the art of theatre. Teachers can easily tie in to subjects such as: language arts, social studies, public speaking, and more.

Post-performance Workshop: “The Art of Storytelling”

After the performance, Christopher guides students in a fun and energetic exploration of stories and the purpose of storytelling; he also provides useful tips and techniques that students can use in: public speaking, acting, and storytelling. All students participate in fun theatre warm-ups and volunteers also get to try their hand at storytelling.

Class Size:

- Limit of 275 students per assembly (discounts for back-to-back assemblies)
