

Washington, D.C. Oct. 4th, ^{1852?} 1882

My Dear Sir,

I greatly regret having heard nothing from you since reaching the U.S. But, this does not excuse saying a word to you. Your paper has been purchased but not forwarded - no good opportunity having yet offered - but, by the next mail I hope to send you a bill of lading showing due shipment. In my interview today (the first I could obtain) with Mr. Whittlesey on the subject of the Territorial printing I found, as was anticipated, much misapprehension as to facts - and tomorrow, I hope to get a definite answer from him as to what he will do in the premises. Inasmuch, however, as his answer to me will not be in time for the current steamer you will have to wait until the next. And by it, I will write you full particulars. At this moment I could say nothing but that which would amount only to a surmise (as to his probable action) thence it will not be well to venture anything at all. You shall know in my next.
