

Winchester Sept 12th 1853

Dear Bush

I left here on the 1st inst for Jacksonville, arrived there on the third hold Court, left on the 10th and reached here today at noon. Court went off well, all the civil causes tried. Grand Jury found seven indictments. McPatton who takes this letter will give you a calender. By the same I send you a letter from Saml Culver. All the floating population are down on the treaty. Permanent settlers rather in favor of it. Saw George had a talk with him tried to be clever but made rather an awkward out of it. Geo I mean. He and the like ilk have succeeded to a considerable extent in creating a prejudice against the Statesman and in favor of the times. Drew and myself have undertaken to correct it, and I flatter myself that we have effected something in that way. The holding of Court in Jacksonville was well received, as the opinion was prevalent that I would not get there on account of the Indian difficulties. I was much pleased with the result. Everything went of well. Too much praise cannot be awarded to the members of the Grand and petit juries, for the promptness with which they attended Court under the circumstances. George did not fight, although he went out portentiously armed from the Wallamette Valley. Nes got to head quarters on Friday last, all in good condition. The howitser is upon the grounds--the wonder of the natives, both Boston and Siwash. Capt Alden is getting well got acquainted with him. A good man and everybody says well deserving of praise for the part he has played in this matter. Major Alvord was camped on Myrtle Creek yesterday, with his command, he has made a reconnoissance of the Canon and Eastern route and commences the western or Cow Creek route today. I think the Canon route will be preferred. He informed us that he expected to get the work under contract this fall. Lem's Tent or rather hut at head quarters is a scene for a painter at any time. Every loafer that the Camp affords makes himself welcome to the best there is. The old man is getting wearied out. He has a good deal of trouble with a good many fellows about this treaty. My heart bled for poor Nes when I heard of the death of his daughter. He and I were playing with her the evening before we started. But "sich is life". Write you blackguard. I have not had a letter from you for a month. From what I see in the Oregonian there promises to be a nice little family quarrel between King Peter & Lovejoy--Boyd. This I learned from the parties. Well I hope they may eat one another up and the survivor die of the surfiet. Peter is going to publish Dryers trip to St. Helens. He ought to have gone along with a cob, or a piece of paper. You ought to take a trip to Jacksonville. It would do you good in more senses than one.
