

Eugene City, June 18th 1869

Dear Bush

Matt will probably have given you all the news in the region before this reaches you. I think this County is sure to give Logan a majority.

Curry and Pengra have advices from Jackson and Josephine to the effect that the race will be close in Jackson while Josephine is thought to be sure for Logan. I start this morning for Umpqua.

Teal says he will be in Salem immediately after the election. I have been unable to do anything with him. He says he left your Indian scrip in Portland and that he will return it to you before the money arrives to pay it or that he will pay you the face of it before or by the time the funds are received. He says he left it with Meyer & Co. at Portland and that he obtained of them some eight hundred dollars worth of goods only on account of it &c &c.

I should judge that he has deposited it as a collateral. Under the circumstances I have concluded to return the receipt. It is impossible for me to get any money on it and he promises to see you soon.

Everybody here is anxious for the publication of Barnhart's statement. An effort is being made to get Jo. Teal, Flem, Owen & Hadley to vote for Stout in order that they may be nominated as candidates for the Legislation next year on the democratic ticket and elect Nesmith to the Senate. Heatherly will not vote, neither will Owens, while Hadley will vote for Logan and I think Teal will not vote, though he is more likely to vote for Stout than either of the above named.
