Dear Sir

I heard Lane make a speech in which he said, "that if" you would "convince" him "that a majority of one vote in Oregon" desired him "to resign," he would "do so cheerfully and immediately." Now he must admit that no Lane vote was cast for Logan, and as Stout's majority (16) comes so very near " a majority of one," that we will readily find the seventeen votes cast for Stout, if he desires to fulfill his declaration as we voted for Stout; and would not cry if the Gen. should take a resignation fit at any time.

If the "State Central Committee" should call the next convention on the basis of Stout's vote, the republicans will carry the next election by an overwhelming majority. I hope and believe that a very respectfully majority of that committee have the welfare of the party at heart and will not be so blind to its interests as to commit so grave an error. As a compromise for contention, we would respectfully suggest that the convention be apportioned as the constitution apportions the members of the "State Legislative Assembly," which would in our humble judgment satisfy all parties and make a very fair disposition of a difficulty.
